### **Tips for**

April Showers may bring May Flowers but that doesn't mean it's a good thing when you are out on the road. Here are some tips to make getting caught in the rain a little safer and more fun, too. Cycle World offers some great tips for riding in the rain-Here are a few of their suggestions:



special dangers if you are riding in the rain, creating slippery areas all around. Go slow and try not to brake suddenly. Don't lean too far and aim to keep a slow, smooth, and steady pace.

3) Beware of Intersections: Intersections pose special dangers for motorcycles anyway, since too many drivers in the other vehicles aren't always paying attention, not to mention the random oil spots. Keep alert.

4) Standing Water: Standing water can create a real road hazard and, if you are on the freeway, there's a real threat of hydroplaning. When possible, avoid using the left lane where concrete barriers often keep water from draining.

5) Traction Inhibitors: Rain can make loads of otherwise inconsequential situations a real problem, such as painted lines, fallen leaves, manhole covers, and such. Look to see if there's a line you can take around these potential dangers. If they are unavoidable don't brake or accelerate hard. Instead, aim to roll over them smoothly.

6) Gear Up: Waterproof, high visibility gear is essential if you want to be comfortable and increase your safety out on the road. Helmets should have an anti-fog visor. Keep it down and closed at all times. Consider a rainsuit, gloves, and boots with additional high visibility details to help you be seen by other drivers.

7) Be a Smooth Operator: Lots of today's bikes have a Rain mode that cuts power and evens out the throttle mapping or increases ABS and traction control. Don't lean too much. Instead, strive to keep your bike as upright as you can to decrease the likelihood of it sliding out. Don't follow other bikes or vehicles too closely and aim to brake as smoothly as you can.


# Largest MOTORCYCLE GRAVEYARD in the World
